PLAINTIFFS: HOTION FOR SUMMARY ADJUDICATION

I, Sherman Glenn, say:

1. I am the principal of Frank Sparkes Elementary School in Winton Elementary School District. I have been the principal of Sparkes Elementary since the fall of 2002. Prior to that, I was the principal of Mountain View Middle School in Chatom Elementary School District. I have extensive knowledge of the students, teachers and facilities at Sparkes Elementary, and am familiar with the curriculum and instructional materials that are provided to Sparkes Elementary students. I have personal knowledge of the facts set forth in this declaration and, if called as a witness, I would and could testify competently thereto.

2. I am generally familiar with the Williams lawsuit and am aware that plaintiffs cite Sparkes Elementary's April 2000 II/USP Action Plan in their motion for summary adjudication to suggest that Sparkes Elementary does not have sufficient and appropriate textbooks. Specifically, plaintiffs quote page seven of the Action Plan which states that there are "inadequate curricular materials to support math, science, spelling instruction" at Sparkes Elementary. I do not know if this was true in April 2000. This has not been true at Sparkes Elementary, however, at least since the time that I have been principal. The students at Sparkes are provided adequate

3. Each student at Sparkes Elementary has a copy of the state-adopted math textbook (the Saxon series) to use in class and to take home. These math textbooks are aligned to State content-standards and were adopted by the district approximately three years ago. The students at Sparkes Elementary are also provided with supplemental materials from the "Acclerated Math" series which are aligned to State content-standards.

4. For this past year, each student at Sparkes Elementary had his or her own copy of two language arts textbooks called "Success For All" and "English." The "English" textbook contains writing and spelling instruction and is aligned to State content-standards. The "Success for All" textbook, although not State-adopted, follows the State framework for language arts instruction and contains much of the State's content-standards. For the 2003-2004 school year, the district purchased a new state-adopted reading/language arts textbook series (Houghton Mifflin) which encompasses spelling instruction. Starting in fall 2003, each student at Sparkes Elementary will be assigned a copy of this new textbook to use in class and take home. Also purchased and set to arrive this fall are new supplemental reading/language arts materials, which will be in English and in Spanish for £L learners.
