I, AMANDA PIERCY, hereby declare:

1. I make this declaration based on my own personal knowledge, and if called to testify as a witness I could and would do so competently as follows:

2. I just finished my freshman year at Balboa High School in San Francisco, California. I am a ROTC student and a member of the honor guard, and I am on the squad drill.

3. There are rats and mice running around in the classrooms all over Balboa High School. I remember one time toward the beginning of the 2002-2003 school year I saw a mouse in the sink in my health class. It was nasty. The whole class got interrupted because everybody came and looked at it, and it the class was chaotic for the rest of the period. I saw mice or rats at school at least once a month for the rest of the year. At the beginning of the year I got really upset when I saw mice but by the end of the year it just seemed normal because it happened all the time.

4. The bathrooms at Balboa are really gross. A lot of the stalls in the girls' bathroom have doors that are broken so that you can't lock them and there is no privacy. If you try to shut the door it just swings open. Often there is no soap in the dispensers or the dispensers are broken. The water that comes out of the tap is really cold, and I don't think it is sanitary. The toilet seats are dirty and have something gooey on them. A lot of the time there is no toilet paper and the toilet paper dispensers are broken. It's not just one particular bathroom at Balboa – they are all like that. I only go to the bathroom at school if I really have to go, and when I do it is always a bad experience. I hold my breath so that I don't have to smell it.

5. Balboa has a leaky roof so water comes into the school every time it rains. My third period English class has two big leaks in the ceiling. One leak is over by the window, and the other is right in the middle of the classroom. The water comes in pretty fast. It is like a faucet dripping, except that the drops are much bigger. My teacher puts down buckets where the water comes in so that we don't get puddles on the floor. By the time I leave my class the buckets are about half full. There are leaks in the hallways outside of the classrooms too, but there are no buckets to catch the water so big puddles form on the ground every time it rains. They are so big you could splash in them. I have never seen anybody do anything about the leaks in the hallways. I asked a teacher why

nobody comes to do something about the leaky roof and she said there's nothing they can do because they don't have any money to fix the leaks.

- 6. My math class was taught by a substitute teacher for the first three months of the school year because they couldn't find enough teachers to teach all the classes at the school. The substitute teacher was really weird and would just talk about random things that had nothing to do with math. We finally got a real teacher some time after Christmas. I feel like I didn't really learn anything in that class until after we got a permanent teacher.
- 7. There were about 42 students in my health class this year. There wasn't enough room in the classroom to have normal desks for all the students, so some students had to sit at tables at the back of the classroom, far away from the board. 42 ninth graders are way too many students for any teacher to handle. Most of the students in the class wanted to learn, but it was impossible because there were just too many students. The teacher would try to talk over the students but it was impossible to hear him. There are always a couple of students who act out in class but when the classes are smaller it is easier for the teacher to keep the class on track. Because this class was so big it was just too hard for the teacher to stay in control of the class. I learn better from lecture than from homework, so it was hard for me to get anything out of the class. I did the work in that class but I still feel like I didn't learn anything.
- 8. My health teacher was brand new to the school and he wasn't qualified to teach the subject matter. He was really supposed to be a biology teacher. He often said things like "you guys have to bear with me, this isn't the subject I am here to teach."
- 9. We didn't have enough books to use in my health class, and we couldn't take the books home. There were between 29 and 31 books for about 42 students to use, so a lot of students had to scoot their desks over to their neighbor and share the book in class. Sharing books slows us down because some kids don't get along well with others so if they are told to share a book they create a disturbance because they are unhappy. Also, you can't move at your own pace because you have to wait for the other person to be able to turn the page. Some students just went without a book so that other students could have the book to themselves. We had homework in the class sometimes but it

1	was always absurd assignments, like "write down what you ate for dinner" or something like that.
2	We could never do homework assignments out of the book because we couldn't take the book home.
3	I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States and the State of
