- I, Alexander Nobori, hereby declare:
- 1. I am a plaintiff in the above-captioned action and if called to testify could and would do so competently as follows:
- 2. I am thirteen years old and an eighth-grader at Brightwood School in Alhambra. I have attended Brightwood since kindergarten.
- 3. My school is old and falling apart, and repairs are done slowly if at all. For example, the steps up to the main office were beat up and cracking all over the place for years. Every time I went in there, I would have to walk very carefully and would be afraid that the steps might give way underneath me at any time. Luckily, they finally fixed them last year.
- 4. Some of the problems with the conditions at Brightwood, make it dangerous to go to school there. Last month, I was sitting up in the school's play area and saw another kid sitting on the swing. While he was on it, one of the chains holding the swing up broke, and the kid fell to the ground. A nurse had to come up and wheel him away in a wheelchair. The swing is still broken. They have just tied it up so no one can use it.
- because the steps from the main campus to the bungalows on the play area are not lit. I was acting as a runner for the school's winter play. The students were supposed to wait in their classrooms until I came and told them that it was time for them to go on. I ran up the stairs to the bungalows on the upper playground to tell the 7th graders that it was their turn to go on. When I headed back down

the stairs, I tripped and fell down 5 to 6 steps. I hurt my tailbone pretty badly, was on crutches and had to miss some days of school. The stairs are dangerous at night because there are no lights. I think if there were lights on the stairs, I would not have fallen and hurt myself.

- 6. My eighth grade classroom is in the main building rather than in a bungalow. We do not have air conditioning in my classroom. When it is hot outside, my classroom becomes very hot. In fact, it is hotter in the classroom than it is outside. I feels to me as if the classroom temperature gets into the 90's.
- 7. When the temperature gets that high, it is very hard to concentrate. Everyone in the rooms sweat a lot, and you can see people who can barely stay awake or who are actually sleeping. The fan we have in the class does not provide much relief. It just moves the hot air around. Also, we sometimes cannot even have the fan on. If the teacher shows a video, we turn the lights off, which cuts the electricity to the fan.
- 8. When it is hot, I also get thirsty all the time. The water fountain outside our class is broken, so we have to bring water bottles to class to try to stay hydrated. If you forget your bottle, you become really thirsty, making even harder to do any work.
- 9. The bathrooms at Brightwood are disgusting. The lighting is bad and they are dark, dirty, and smell awful. In past years, there often were no paper towels. There was never any soap or hot water so I could not wash my hands properly. Also, the toilets overflowed a lot, so there would be dirty water on the floor of the bathrooms or the floors would be gross and sticky. It does not

seem that the bathrooms get cleaned much.

- 10. There are not many bathrooms at the school either. I think there are three bathrooms for boys that each have two stalls and 3 or 4 urinals.
- 11. The bathrooms are so gross, I rarely use them. In fact, I have not used a stall even once this year. I have just learned to hold it until I get home.
- 12. I have been at Brightwood since I was in kindergarten, so it is hard for me to compare Brightwood to any other school. But I do know that our classrooms should not be so hot that the students can barely stay awake and that our bathrooms should be clean and usable, not smelly and disgusting. I think it is unfair for us to have to try to learn in conditions like these.
- already been to Keppel because I take an advanced math class there. The conditions at Keppel are pretty bad also. I know that there is only one bathroom in the whole main school building, and there are no doors on the stalls. I think students deserve basic privacy when they use the bathrooms, and it is disappointing to me that poor conditions exist at Keppel.
