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Declaration of Jilleen Sargent

- I, Jilleen Sargent, hereby declare:
- 1. I make this declaration based on my own personal knowledge and if called to testify I could and would do so competently as follows:
- I have been a teacher at Fremont High School for 12 years. I teach English,
 honors English, and AP English to 11th grade students.
 - The classrooms at Fremont High are either way too hot or way too cold. Between 3. 1990 and 1998, I taught in room C-5, which is a hot, windowless room with no ventilation. I have fainted several times because of the heat in that classroom. During the hot months of 1991 and 1992, I had to go to see a doctor because I fainted several times due to the heat. I know that the room was regularly as hot as 95 degrees some summer afternoons during the 1992-1993 school year, because I brought in my own thermometer to measure the temperature. When it got that hot, my students became lethargic and put their heads down on their desks. I could see that the students' faces were flushed. Some students told me that they could not learn in extreme heat because it was too difficult for them to concentrate. I fainted several times because of the heat in that room, and I have developed permanent respiratory problems because of the lack of ventilation. Then, during the 1998-1999 school year, I was moved to classroom C-6, which also had no windows. Room C-6 was frigid during the Winter. My students wore hats and gloves inside the classroom in order to stay warm that year. They told me that the extremely cold air made it difficult for them to write, so they wrote with their gloves on. Because it was so cold, I brought in extra sweatshirts and sweaters for my students to wear while they were in the classroom. Last year, during the 2000-2001 school year, I was moved into room 231, which also became extremely hot. I had to take 8 days of sick leave that year because the heat was so unbearable that it made me dehydrated and ill.
 - 4. One of the air conditioning systems at Fremont High is so old that when a part breaks, the school administration has trouble finding new parts. In 2000, when the air

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conditioning was broken, the custodians told me that the part that was broken wasn't even
 manufactured any more, and that they would probably have to have a new one made.

5. Sometimes there are not enough books for each student to have one. At the beginning of the July, 2001 school year, I was forced to change my lesson plan because the school didn't issue me enough copies of Of Mice and Men for my class to use. The school issued only 20 copies of the book to my 9th grade class, even though I had 36 students. I didn't get enough books for my class until two weeks of the school year had already passed.

1 Several classrooms at Fremont High are divided in half so that two classes can meet in the same room at the same time. From 1999 to 2001, my English class had to meet in the same room as the special education class. The two classes were only separated by an old, ripped plastic curtain with holes in it. Students in the special education class sometimes threw things into my classroom through the holes in the curtain. My students could hear everything that happened in the special education class, and the noise made it hard for my students to concentrate all the time, but especially during silent reading periods. I filled out the request for maintenance and repair form two times, but I was told that it required a special team from the district, and that they were working on other things. Finally, in January of 2000, I spent \$100.00 of my own money on wood and asked the shop class to build a wooden wall to separate the classes, but the wall was damaged and taken down when I went off-track. In September, 2000, my 9th grade English honors class wrote an article for the school newspaper explaining how hard it was to learn without a wall surrounding the classroom. One month after the article came out, the school administration had a wall installed between the classes, but there was still a four-inch gap between the wall and the window, and noise from the special education class still interfered with my class. I put in an order to have the wall soundproofed, but the plant manager rejected the order. I eventually had to pay another \$100.00 of my own money for supplies, and students in the wood shop class soundproofed the wall.

6. Some classes at Fremont High are never assigned a permanent teacher. The

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
