#### **Declaration of Petra Jones**

#### I, Petra Jones, hereby declare:

- 1. I make this declaration based on my own personal knowledge and if called to testify I could and would do so competently as follows:
- 2. I have been a teacher at Gage Middle School in Huntington Park for 15 years. I currently teach eighth grade English and leadership classes. There are severe problems with rats, overcrowding, and facilities at Gage that greatly affect students' ability to learn and teachers' ability to teach.
- 3. There is a terrible rat problem at Gage. We have lost the Internet connections in our far east building because rats have bitten through the cables. The administrator in charge of the plant says the district experts say that we can't get the Internet fixed until the rats have been eliminated. I also know that one of the school secretaries has seen traces of rats on her desk and she told me that a big rat ran over her foot. The pest people came in and put a couple of sticky traps out, but based on the descriptions of the secretary those traps aren't going to do much—given the size of the rats compared to the size of the traps they might as well have put down scotch tape.
- 4. The overcrowding problem at Gage is unbearable. We have approximately 300 more students this year than we did last year. We are a multi-track school and we are bursting at the seams.
- 5. The P.E. field at our school was never finished after the school was reconstructed about 10 years ago. What this means is that the students essentially have no outdoor space to play on for their P.E. classes and so they must play in spaces that are close to classrooms where classes are in session. The P.E. teachers have no room to hold their classes and so students are playing games right near classes that are in session. It is extremely noisy and distracting. One teacher, who had her classroom door open to cool down a classroom without air conditioning, kept having to remove a soccer ball from the front of her room because the ball the children in P.E. were using kept entering her room.
  - 6. We do not have a student cafeteria, auditorium, or a gym at Gage Middle School

 because the school had to be reconstructed approximately 10 years ago to create more classroom space. The only place we have for assemblies, dances, and other school-wide functions, the multi-purpose room, is now used as classroom space. Currently, the music classes are being held in the library, and this limits teachers' ability to bring students to the library to do research and other projects. Every available space at Gage is used for classes and that means that children really miss out on other activities that help them learn and keep students in school.

- 7. We have an incredible number of traveling teachers at Gage. Additionally, most of the teachers share their classes with at least one other teacher and so during our conference periods when we are supposed to be preparing for other classes we have no place to go. Our principal is in the process of assigning any empty space in the school to teachers who are on their conference periods but the situation here is just terrible. During my conference period, I sit in the hallway where they sell the dance tickets. Most teachers do not even have a hallway to sit in. When a teacher has to travel that teacher cannot do the same kind of projects with the students that he/she would normally do because the logistics of carrying materials and supplies from place to place and storing things is just impossible to pull off. Teachers cannot provide the type of innovative lessons they want to provide because they spend much of their day moving from place to place. It is just horrid. Also, finding traveling teachers can be very difficult both for the administrative staff and the students. The students get particularly confused because often they are unable to find their teacher at other times during the day when they are not in that teacher's class.
- 8. Multi-tracking is extremely detrimental for the children. In a traditional calendar year there is only one long break, however, multi-track schedule students have one break in between each semester and students backslide each time they go off track. This means that the teachers must review what the students have learned twice a year. Additionally, the day for students is just so much longer to make up for the fact that they are not in school as many days as other students. For middle school students this is difficult. Our day goes from 7:25am-3:13pm. Studies show that for students in middle school and high school the optimum time to be teaching is at about 11am, but yet we keep starting earlier and earlier each year.

- 9. As a result of overcrowding, our intersession (summer school in traditional schools) classes now have to be held after the regular school hours from 3:30-5:45pm. Several years ago, when the school was a little less crowded, our students could take two intercession classes per session to, for example, make up for two classes they had failed. Now these students are only allowed to take one intersession class. There just aren't enough hours in the day. We also have night school and other programs and we can't fit all of these things in one set of buildings.
- enough custodial staff. When there are so many students and so many people using the school all year round, the building never gets a break. With so much foot traffic we need a larger maintenance and custodial staff. Our campus is depressing because it is dirty, there are big black splotches of gum all over, and dirt and trash is everywhere. The carpets in the building aren't getting vacuumed regularly unless the teachers bring in their own vacuum cleaners and do the job themselves. The custodians just can't keep up with it all. Additionally, the paint is peeling off in chunks from the walls in my room, which have not been painted for at least 10 years. It would seem to me that deep cleaning of a cafeteria that serves 2,400 meals twice a day all year round needs to happen more than twice annually the number of times it is currently deep-cleaned by the district. Rooms that are in use from 7:25am 5:30pm or longer, almost every day of the year, need additional attention.
- 11. We don't have enough bathrooms for the students and staff at Gage. The students must stand in long lines to use the bathrooms. There are over 2,400 students at Gage and only 4 sets of bathrooms. Again, it is impossible for the custodial staff to keep them properly stocked or clean because there are just too many students and people using them. It is really terrible.
- 12. Gage is so overcrowded that at lunch time students have a difficult time getting their food because the lines are so long. To alleviate some of the congestion, cafeteria staff take a rolling cart with food on it to a different part of the campus so that students have another way to get food. The covered area where the students are supposed to sit during lunch time cannot accommodate all of the students who need to eat at lunch or nutrition and so students sit on the

- 13. Because of the overcrowding and the lack of a P.E. field, the children have nowhere to play during lunch and nutrition. It is really sad. Before the students could play basketball, soccer, or other games, but we only have three basketball hoops and they can't play soccer because if they did they would injure someone -- it is just that crowded. There are students everywhere.
- 14. Currently at Gage, September of 2001, there are six teacher vacancies. Two of the vacancies are in off track positions and the other four are in on track positions. For the most part we try to get off track teachers to fill the vacancies, because then at least the students only have two different teachers in one semester instead of rotating substitutes. This is not ideal because the students have different teachers with different teaching styles and no continuity. We try to make do but the children's education suffers.
- Some of the rooms at Gage do not have any air conditioning at all. For the 15. students and teachers in classes without air conditioning the conditions are just horrible. Most of the classrooms at the school do not have windows that open or maybe there will be a few windows that open, but they are usually high up and so the classes don't get any air movement. The children are just melting. When it is hot and you don't have air conditioning in classes it just really sucks the life out of both the teachers and students. I know because for about seven years the air conditioning did not function regularly in my classroom. The teachers who are currently suffering in classrooms without air conditioning probably experience days with high temperatures and uncomfortable conditions from about March until October.
