

Declaration of Angelica Araya

I, ANGELICA ARAYA, hereby declare:

- 1. I make this declaration based on my own personal knowledge and if called to testify I could and would do so competently as follows:
- 2. I just graduated from eighth grade at Luther Burbank Middle School in San Francisco, California. I will be going to Burton High School in the fall.
- 3. Luther Burbank is very dirty and has cockroaches and rats all over the school.

 I have seen rats in the gym and the girls' locker room, and sometimes when the lights are turned on in the gym we can see rats scurry out and into the walls. My gym teacher told me that a rat ran across her foot. During English class in seventh grade, I saw a rat run across the place where they keep the chalk and erasers. I have seen cockroaches in my math and science classroom. I have also seen cockroaches in the hallways on the floor. One time in my science class with Mr. Candia there was a cockroach crawling on the ceiling and it fell about two feet away from my teacher's head. The whole class started screaming. I have complained to two of my teachers,

 [REDACTED] , about how dirty the school is, and asked why there are so many cockroaches and rats in the school. Both teachers told me there is nothing they could do about it.
- 4. In the hallways there are a lot of tiles missing from the ceiling. They are also cracked up and look very old. In some of the classes there are windows that are either missing or loose. That isn't safe for the students. For example, one time during math class one of the windows near where I was sitting came loose and just fell right out onto the floor. My teacher called up to the principal's office, but they didn't seem to care. The next day when we came to class someone had just leaned the broken window back in the place where it was before. If anyone had bumped into it or leaned against the window, it would have fallen right out again. I have seen other schools, and I think that Luther Burbank is much worse than other schools. It looks scary, windows are missing, and you can tell from the outside the blinds are all torn up.
- 5. There are times when it is so, so hot in my classrooms, and there is no air conditioning at all. There are also times when it is so, so cold, but no heaters that would work. In my social studies and math class this year (eighth grade) it was really, really hot for about a

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- 6. The bathrooms are really gross. I never use the bathrooms, because they smell so bad, and in both the first and third floor bathrooms one of the stalls has no door. I just hold it until I come home. Last year and this year, all of the bathroom doors were locked during class so students can't use them. Sometimes this year during lunch one of the bathrooms would also be locked. I know of two people who had accidents during school, because they didn't want to use the bathrooms or couldn't get into them. There is no soap in any of the bathrooms even though there are soap dispensers. Sometimes there are no paper towels to use to dry your hands either. There are not enough stalls for everyone to use. Sometimes there are lines for the bathroom. There are nine stalls total for girls in the school and nine for the boys, three on each floor.
- 7. In science they sent a note home telling us we had to purchase markers and crayons, because we were doing a poster project on smoking. If kids didn't have the money to buy them then they would have to share the few crayons that the school had. At the beginning of each school year, they also send home a notice with a list of things that we must buy to use at the school like paper, pencils, erasers, and stuff like that.

- 8. My teachers had to buy their own supplies, and I don't think that is right. For example, in science Mr. Candia bought squid and also cow eyeballs for us to dissect because the school wouldn't buy them. We had to share one eye to a table because that's all he could buy. He told us he bought this with his own money so we should be careful because the other classes had to use it too. We also didn't have enough dissecting knives to dissect the eyeballs, and the ones we had were all rusty and gross so instead we used stencil blades. Ms. Stewart and Ms. Habib also bought books for us to read during free time or to use for book reports. Ms. Stewart bought a whole carousel of books for us that she told us she bought with her own money. I think they did this because our library wasn't very good, and they wanted us to have books to read. They would also send home notices asking for book donations or money for donations to buy books. We do have a library at the school, but it is hard to use because we don't have a librarian.
- 9. I could not bring textbooks home in most of my classes, because we did not have enough books. We had only one set of books for all the students in most teachers' classes to use. The books we did have were all broken up, had writing on them, and were falling apart. In my social studies classroom we had to share books sometimes two to a student because there weren't enough for all the students who needed them. We would have to share books in class when another teacher had borrowed books from our classroom, so we have even less than the class set. Because we couldn't take any of our books home from school the teacher would zerox our assignments for us from the books. However, sometimes the copy machine would break down or run out of paper and then there wouldn't be enough assignments for everyone to take home.
- 10. I have had a different principal every year I have been at Luther Burbank. When I see so many principals leaving, I feel like nothing will change and no one cares about making things better. When you complain to the principal you feel like nothing will happen, because they will probably just leave the next year.
- In my eighth grade year two of my six teachers left during the school year. One of my seventh grade teachers, [REDACTED], left a month before the school year was out. Four of my other teachers are also no longer working at the school. It bothers me, but what can I do. We just have

to deal with it when the teacher's leave, because there really isn't anything we can do.

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12. It is very important to me that these things get fixed, because, if ever my brother or one of my cousins has to go to this school, then I don't want them to have to deal with what I've had to deal with. Nobody should have to go to a school like this.

I declare under penalty of perjury of the laws of the State of California and the United States that the foregoing is true and correct. Executed this 2 day of June, 2001 in San Francisco, California.
