I, Selena Wilson, hereby declare:

- 1. I make this declaration based on my own personal knowledge and if called to testify I could and would do so competently as follows:
- 2. I am a junior at Castlemont High School in Oakland. I have attended Castlemont during the 1999-2000, 2000-2001, and 2001-2002 school years.
- 3. At Castlemont we have had three different principals in three years. It makes me really sad that principals don't stay at our school and it is difficult for the students because there are different rules every year. I really feel like there is no one who has been here throughout my time at Castlemont that I can go to if I am having problems. Who knows if the principal this year will actually stay with us.
- disorganized and chaotic. The administration did not begin to give out books until about two or three weeks into the school year. For the first few weeks I had no books and was given handouts in all of my classes except for chemistry. In my chemistry class the teacher is really proactive and had a class set of books for us on the first day. It was wonderful because we actually read on the first day and in the first month of school we have already covered several chapters of material. The situation in my chemistry class should be replicated in all of my other classes. Unfortunately in my other classes we really only got started with our work about two or three weeks into the school year. I feel like the first few weeks have been a real waste of learning time because so many students did not and still do not have books, teachers have had to make copies or different lessons for us, and students are sharing materials in class. I don't understand why we do not begin the school year on the first day of school with all of the materials we need to learn.
- 5. During the 2001-2002 school year, I was given a schedule on the first day of school that did not have a fourth period and so I had no idea where I was supposed to go during that hour when I was supposed to be in a classroom. The school administration made announcements over the loud speaker telling all of the students who did not have enough classes

to go to the cafeteria. When I went into the cafeteria I saw fifty or so students who had schedules with missing periods. I went to the counseling office and it was also overflowing with students. What an incredible waste for so many students to just be walking around the school or sitting in the cafeteria when they could be in class.

- 6. In my advanced algebra/trigonometry class during the 2001-2002 school year, my book is falling apart, the cover is coming off, and there is writing on many of the pages. It makes me feel like the administration does not care about us when they give us books in such terrible condition.
- 7. My Spanish II class during the 2001-2002 school year was and is still extremely overcrowded. It is so overcrowded that students are sitting in chairs between rows of desks.
- 8. During the 2000-2001 school year, my biology class lacked basic materials. When we did experiments in that class my teacher had to pay for the materials. For example, the teacher bought one cow eye for all his classes with his own money and we all crowded around to watch him dissect it. I know that he bought the cow eye with his own money because he told the class he had. This teacher also told us to be extremely careful because it was the only one he had for all the periods of biology. In my physical science class during the 1999-2000 school year, we did not do any experiments during the school year, only book work.
- 9. In my art class during the 1999-2000 school year, my teacher was 5 20 minutes late for class at least two days per week. I spoke to one of the school administrators about this and he said that there was nothing he could do about it. I don't think it is right for students to have to miss so much time out of their class period because the teacher does not show up at the time class is supposed to start.
- I am on the Castlemont track team. During the 1999-2000 school year I received credit for my participation in track in an advanced sports class. During the 2000-2001 and 2001-2002 school years I have participated in track as an extracurricular activity. The track team lacks even the most basic supplies that one would expect a track team to have. We do not have hurdles or a pit. The shot putter and discus thrower had to buy her own shot put and disc, and our coach has basically had to buy all of the other materials and some of the materials, such as our ladders,

several members of our team helped the coach to assemble. Our hurdler actually only learned how to jump hurdles because she practiced on hurdles at the other richer schools we go to for track meets. Not having even basic materials to use makes me feel disadvantaged compared to other schools.

- The counseling situation at Castlemont is horrible. There are not enough counselors at Castlemont and this affects your ability to get classes you need to graduate and to go to college. It is extremely difficult to get a counseling appointment and this year I have had many problems with my schedule. It has taken a week or two just for me to change out of classes I was not supposed to be in. During the 2001-2002 school year, I was placed in a Spanish II class for about a week and a half before I was able to transfer back into a Spanish I class, the class I was supposed to be in. I also had no fourth period for about four days and so during the time I was supposed to be in class I just went into another teacher's class and hung out. It was a complete waste. Another problem on my schedule this year was that I was placed in a regular English class even though my teacher had requested that I be placed in an AP English class. The first English class that the counselors placed me in was held in an extremely crowded portable and I was only transferred to an AP class two weeks later. I am still playing catch-up in the AP class because I missed a lot. This AP class is still not on my schedule even though I have now been attending the class for about three weeks.
- There are not enough computers at Castlemont. Our English teachers often ask the students in their classes to type their papers. Unfortunately, the school does not have computers that are accessible to students and many students do not have computers at home. So most students will just hand write their papers and take a lower grade because they have no other choice.
- 13. At Castlemont we are not receiving the same education as other students in the state and when we get out into the real world we are going to have to compete with these students and that is just not fair. The students at Castlemont are being set up to fail.
